RULES & REGULATIONS

Annual Membership

- The annual membership fee is \$10.00. Each exhibitor must purchase a membership ticket from the Secretary before making entries, except those entering the Junior School Class, pee wee cattle & pee wee sheep.
- A membership ticket is good for one admission
- **Attention to Horse, Cattle & Sheep Exhibitors: please be advised that all vehicles with handlers entering the fair grounds MUST stop at the gates and present a membership card. If you do not have a membership card the cost is \$10.00 each person in the vehicle. All exhibitors will be allowed one handler, all others must pay. Please contact your committee member or the fair secretary to get a single membership card. Thank you for your honesty & support in this matter**

Exhibitor Registration

- All competitors must have their articles registered with the Secretary, and articles exhibited inside the hall must be in and placed **before 12 noon on Friday before the fair. The exhibit hall will be open Thursday August 29, 7-8 p.m. & Friday August 30, 9-noon.** Any exhibitor who places entries without registering with the Secretary first will have their prize money forfeited.
- All prize cards which have been affixed by the judges must be displayed. Any violation of this rule will forfeit their prizes.
- **Inside exhibits must not be removed before 4:30 pm, on fair day.**

Animals/Produce/Articles

- All produce must have been grown by the exhibitor during the current year unless otherwise stated. Potatoes must be exhibited in boxes or baskets.
- Cows must have borne young during the current year. Cows must be giving milk at time of exhibition or give evidence of being well gone in calf.
- Each animal must provide a chain, rope, leash or cage and be placed on the show grounds with those of its class, and exhibitors of pure bred stock must produce the certification of registration for animals one year or over. Proof of vaccinations must be carried with exhibitor.
- No animal or article is entitled to more than 1 prize except in special cases.
- No person shall be permitted in the horse or cattle rings at the time of judging except judges, groom, or any other person in charge of the animals.
- All manufacturers to be the property of the maker or their agent. Articles shown under the head of Homecraft Department, work must have been made by the exhibitors or their families. Exhibitors in all cases are to be the producer and bonafide owner.
- Upon the discovery of any fraud or any deception either in the production or ownership concerning any article exhibited, the Directors will have the power to withhold the prize awarded and prohibit any such party from exhibiting in any class for two years, and may publish the name of such persons if deemed expedient.

Interference with Judges

- Any person who shall attempt to interfere with, or influence the judges while discharging their duties, or who shall at any time on the premises of the Society use abusive language to any judge in consequence of any award made by him/her shall forfeit the right to any prize to which he/she might otherwise be entitled. Judges are requested to immediately report a breach of this rule.

Payment of Prizes

- The judges have power to withhold any prize offered when the animal or article is deemed by them unworthy of a prize.
- The Society will not be responsible for the payment of special prizes.
- The Directors do not hold themselves responsible for the full amount of the prizes offered in this list, but will, if the funds be not sufficient, pay the largest percentage the funds will allow.
- The size of the exhibit mentioned in the Prize List must be complied with or no prize will be given.
- Unless otherwise specified, prize money will be paid by cheque or cash where indicated and sent/given to the exhibitor by November 1st. **ALL CHEQUES SHOULD BE CASHED BEFORE DECEMBER 31, OF THE CURRENT YEAR.**
- **All exhibitors winning prize money in the amount of \$10.00 or more, \$10.00 will be retained for membership the following year. After the \$10.00 has been retained for the next years membership and the remaining monies is less than \$10.00, this money will not be paid out in a cheque but will be forwarded and included in next years prize money.**
- A surcharge of 10% will be charged on winnings of \$10.00 and over except Junior class, and classes where an entry fee is charged per entry.
- Gifts may be substituted for monetary prizes.
- The Society regrets any errors or omissions in the prize book, but cannot accept any responsibility or offer any compensation.

Lost/Stolen Items

- While the Directors will take every precaution under the circumstances to secure the safety of all articles sent to the exhibition, the owner himself must bear the risk of exhibiting his goods and should any article be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power toward recovery, but will not be responsible for the value thereof.

Exhibitor Complaints

- Any exhibitor lodging a protest must do so in writing and must deliver it to the Secretary within a week of the cause of protest. It must be accompanied by a deposit of \$10.00, which sum shall be forfeited to the Society if the said protest is not sustained.

Powers of Directors and Appointed Constables

- Any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction in any city, town village or township wherein a fair or exhibition is held, shall, on the request of the president or executive committee of any society, appoint as many constables as may be required.
- Such constables shall be paid by the society and it shall be their duty to protect the property of the society within the grounds, and to eject all persons who may be improperly within the grounds, or behave in a disorderly manner, or violate any of the rules or regulations of such society.
- Any person who willfully hinders or obstructs the officers or servants of any society or any constable appointed under this section in the execution of their duties or who gains admission to the grounds contrary to the rules of the society shall be liable to a penalty of not less than \$1.00 and not more than \$20.00, to be paid to such society for its use and benefit, R.S.O. 1060 Chapter 11, Sec. 3

GENERAL RULES FOR SADDLE HORSE SHOW

1. **Order of showing will vary from order of Sections.**
2. At their discretion, the Horse Show Committee has the right to change/cancel individual classes or limit the number of entries per section on show date. The Horse Show Committee members have the final decision in any matter pertaining to the show.
3. One entry per exhibitor in all sections.
4. No cross entries between Classes unless otherwise stated.
5. Anyone wishing to withdraw their entry from a section must do so at least 2 section in advance. Section entry fees (if applicable) must be paid prior to entering any section.
6. Each entry must have a paid fair membership number and must be registered with the Show Secretary prior to showing in each section.
7. Please have 3-part entry form (attached in fair book) filled out prior to registering with Fair Secretary on Fair day.
8. **Exhibitor/owner must bring a copy of proof of insurance attached to registration sheet**

E. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.

F. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

Local Fair Competition

1. **Local fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilt, (min. 324" measured on the perimeter)** judged the best of show of all hand quilted quilts to the District Competition. **OR** If any entry wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of ALL ELIGIBLE QUILTS at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST OF SHOW OF ALL CLASSES quilt in the District Competition.

NOTE: If an Exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.

2. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.



3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of all ELIGIBLE quilts. As well as RESERVE Grand Champion or SECOND Best of Show of all ELIGIBLE quilts. The GRAND CHAMPION and the RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE quilts.

Annual Machine-Quilted Championship Quilt Competition

ELIGIBILITY, RULES AND REGULATIONS: General Conditions

A. Quilt must be solely made and machine quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.

B. Quilt to be measured on the perimeter .Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches .Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc.

C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Machine Quilted Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.

D. Upon making entry into the OAAS Machine Quilting Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.

E. The winning OAAS Machine Quilted Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or OAAS Provincial competition.

F. The winner's name to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by OAAS.

G. Quilt must have visible machine quilting

I. Quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back)and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.

Local Fair Competition Annual Hand Quilted Quilt & Machine-Quilted Quilt/Wall Hanging

Local Fair Competition

1 Each local fair is entitled to send only one Grand Champion Machine-Quilted Quilt, judged best of show of all eligible machine quilted Quilt to the District Competition **OR** If any entry wins *Grand Champion* or *Best of Show* of all eligible *Machine-Quilted Quilts* at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this item was entered and won, should enter their *Reserve Champion* or *Second Best of Show* of eligible Machine-Quilted Quilt in the District Competition.

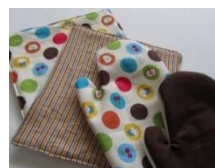
